Remote Learning Survey

Thank you to all the parents who participated in our remote learning survey last week. A summary of the survey is attached as a pdf. To this end we will continue with seesaw as our main learning platform. Our class teachers will attempt two Zoom classes per week after the mid term break except in the cases of classes where hardly any pupils log on. In this instance we will keep it to one class.

Minor works

During lockdown we have been busy maintaining the school building. We have removed old carpets from the remaining four classrooms and replaced them with marmoleum which has been sealed. We are installing state of the art Promethean Panels in three classrooms. As mentioned previously, we are planning to erect perimeter fencing along the graveyard boundary wall and Aldi exit to prevent trespassing and dog fouling.

Return to school

We are still awaiting a confirmation date for the return to school of all our pupils. There was a proposal of an early return in January of pupils with additional needs but that was postponed due to high Covid case numbers. Hopefully we are nearer to a return date as we would all love to be back at school.

Sheila joined the teaching team 22 years ago, having previously worked in Dublin. She took on the role of Junior Infant teacher and brought with her exuberance, energy and experience. Her teaching methods were forward thinking and were adopted by her colleagues. Sheila than joined the Special Education Team and became an invaluable member of the group. With constant upskilling, she carved out a hugely important role as advocate for pupils with speech, language and hearing difficulties and ensured that those in her charge had access to the best resources and programmes in order to meet their needs. She also took on the roles of promoter of oral Irish, mentor for newly qualified teachers, trainer of the quiz teams and organiser of reading resources. The staff is hugely grateful for her trojan work and friendship and wishes her a long and healthy retirement!
